


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Rector's Ramblin's: Which God?

Yet, when I told a friend about it, he took one look and said, "Bob, you're crazy; look at that picture, look at his face, his eyes. That God is gonna' get ya."



I guess it depends on our perspective, on how we envision or think about God. Despite assurances of grace and forgiveness, it's often hard to think of God as anything but a vengeful judge, waiting to pronounce the sentence – to separate the sheep from the goats, and there's no doubt where we'll be.

But, is God going to "get" us with lightning bolts, wrath and the consuming fires of Hell? Again, it's sometimes hard to believe otherwise in the midst of the tragedy, fear, pain, and sorrow that often fill our lives. And even when things are going great and "God is smiling on us," how many of us keep a wary eye out, waiting for the other shoe to fall?

Could it be that God is waiting to surprise us, not with the other shoe, but with better things than we can imagine? Could it be that God is quivering with anticipation at the thought of giving us gifts, love and peace beyond our comprehension? Could it be that we just don't ask for enough or believe that we could ever receive such gifts. Or, is it that we are so bound up in our own perception of a God who gives us only what we

deserve - goats that we are - that we can't even see the gifts offered to us, much less accept them and be surprised by Joy? I guess it depends on our perspective.

Outreach Focus: Episcopal Farm Workers Ministry

The Mission of The Episcopal Farmworker Ministry is to respond to the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of farmworkers and actively supports opportunities for them to become self-directive. Their mission is in line with the Episcopal Church's baptismal covenant, as well as with the specific Mission of Trinity Church. The Ministry was founded and is supported by the Episcopal Church, the Diocese of Eastern North Carolina, and the Diocese of North Carolina. They are located practically in our backyard, which makes volunteering with them a convenient and worthwhile endeavor.



For several years, we have supported the EFW Ministry financially. In addition, a few of our members serve in paid and volunteer positions at the Ministry. A very dedicated member of our congregation, Shirley Lamont, has been a continual presence at the Ministry as both an employee and a volunteer for several years. She is very passionate about the Ministry and will happily share with you her experiences there.



In recent weeks, we have had several folks from Trinity volunteering on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of the Month to help distribute food. Those who have spent their time volunteering can attest to how rewarding it is to share time and a meal with this team of dedicated folks. The Ministry serves people who are maligned by many who believe that migrant farmworkers are inferior don't deserve better for themselves than to simply get by. When we serve the farmworkers and their families, who literally put food on our tables, we show them that we see them as equal to ourselves and deserving of a better life.

What could be more Christian than that?

Look at What We're Doing With EFWM

On Sunday, September 25th, Father Bob's sermon explored our relationship with the poor and downtrodden. "We can't help everyone" we heard. But we certainly can help some. That spirit and ministry is right in our back yard with agricultural workers. Farmworkers are an integral part of the NC economy, playing a significant role in providing an ample supply of low-cost food year-round for our households. Yet, despite their essential role in feeding our State, farmworkers are often mistreated and abused by employers and face a multitude of barriers that keep them from ensuring even the most basic living standards.



Farmworkers are routinely subjected to substandard housing, pesticide exposure, dangerous and exhausting work, inadequate wages, frequent housing and labor violations, intimidation, job loss if violations are reported, language and educational barriers, lack of transportation, and extreme isolation. The poverty and injustice that farmworkers endure are not merely the problems of an invisible group of transient unknowns, but of individuals with names and identities.

The Episcopal Farmworkers Ministry seeks to make conditions and lives better for these children of God. As noted in Donna Wooten's article, Trinity has continually supported this important ministry both with financial and sweat equity contributions.

Food distribution takes place every 2nd and 4th Saturday of the month, and we would like to recruit more Trinity volunteers for this rewarding ministry. Between 250-300 families receive boxes of food at each event.

You don't have to commit to being there every two weeks. But if you can volunteer, even if occasionally, it builds a bigger Trinity team for this important ministry.

The Altar Guild keeps the sanctuary in a state of readiness for worship.



Sonnet Sequence with Todd Truffin

"St. Saint" by Lisa Russ Spaar

Even my dreams won't reveal you, though the hand wants its scepter.

Instead, the sublimity of backdrop, All Hallows, solemn close of paschal drawers,

wounded stare, the all-out decking of box stores. Fa la la, la la. O beloved departed, la-la, la-la,

obligate me, after work, a long day in a body, passing beneath blooded lintels, maples, red oaks--

interpreters, I might be so bold to call them-to sing in sacrifice, from century to century.

Your tale is not mine, of course, to tell. But the world is ingot-cast

cinders now & this hour already a beyond. What weary head doesn't crave its nimbus?



Lisa Russ Spaar was one of the first visiting professors to address the MFA program while I was studying. I had never heard of her work, but I quickly appreciated her way of making the every-day magical. She was one of the first writers I saw "writing what you know" and admitting that what she knew was American suburbia. I won't pretend that "St. Saint" is a regular sonnet or that it is a clear window to spiritual guidance. I will note that it is a "sonnet-like" thing: 14 lines, a turn near the end, and a self-contained logic. I will also note that amidst the box stores and cinders, this poem points me, at least, to the refrain of that favorite All Hallow's hymn: "for the saints of God are just folk like me, and I mean to be one too."

While the hymn is jaunty and hopeful, Spaar's poem catching our would be saint "after work, a long day in a body." The tired soul struggles to make sense of the box stores filled with Christmas wares before Halloween is over. What helps our exhausted saint? The "maples, red oaks" whose leaves turn red as the "blooded lintels." These natural singers bring together Christmas and Easter, Halloween and Passover as well as the faith from "century to century.

The speaker sighs, and, in a mystery, "craves" the halo of the saints of God, even if she is too weary to see past the cinder parking lot and the crass commercialism.
